

LANGUAGE AND CULTURE PROGRAM QUESTION What is Reconciliation? TIMELINE 60-120 minutes LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- To understand the link between language and culture, and their influence on worldview
- To reflect on the effects of the Indian Act, residential schools, the 60s scoop and other events on Indigenous languages and cultures
- To take an active part in the revitalization and preservation of Indigenous languages

CONTENT

According to the 2016 census, there are over 70 Indigenous languages in use across Canada. Currently Cree, Inuktituk, and Ojibway have the highest number of speakers. Despite this diversity, overall only 1:6 Indigenous persons (or 17%) can hold a conversation in an Indigenous language. Language is critical to sharing traditional knowledge, family and community history, and cultural worldview. Sadly, years of colonial systems and structures, most notably the imposition of Residential Schools, severed these connections, meaning that for many generations, knowledge and understanding about their communities and their cultural identities was lost for Indigenous peoples.

This unit will explore the connection between language, culture and identity, and will highlight some of the people and organizations working to reintroduce and preserve language and culture to their own communities, and to use them to educate Canadians more broadly.
