



One event I was able to attend was our inaugural Professional Development (PD) Conference held in Toronto, June 9-11. This PD conference represented the first time Experiences Canada brought together our Exchanges group organizers from across the country. As a newcomer, it was invaluable to hear firsthand from educators and youth leaders about their experiences. and how the program so positively influenced the lives of their youth participants. Over the weekend, a range of topics were covered from a suicide prevention workshop. to how to organize and fundraise for twinned groups of 30 youth, to what a Northern Canada Indigenous Exchange is really like (including two youth speakers who shared their memories). We plan to build off the success of the 2023 PD Conference and continue to deliver dynamic. informative events in 2024 and 2025.

The past year has laid the foundation for an even busier and more productive one in 2023 – 2024 and we are seeing the fruits of those efforts in the rising application numbers for Exchanges in 2023-2024. In addition, the excellent resources the team developed are helping Canadian youth in a range of ways; our Career Choices pages are the most visited on our website. The success of the past year's virtual youth forums has led to renewed funding for four youth forums (virtual and in-person) to be delivered between 2024 and 2026.

It is impressive to see how much was accomplished in

2022-2023, and I am excited to be part of a passionate team ready to build on this past year's successes.

REPORT FROM THE CHAIR, AUDIT,

AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

behalf of the Audit and Finance Committee of Experiences Canada, I am reporting the financial results for the 2022-23 fiscal year. This report is derived from our audited financial statements for the year ended August 31, 2023, which are available on our website or upon request.

Experiences Canada completed its first year of a threeyear funding agreement with the Federal Government's Exchanges Canada Program. We wish to thank the Minister of Canadian Heritage and the departmental staff at Exchanges Canada for their steadfast support and commitment to our program.

As travel and in-person connections continue to increase, all the effort made by the staff to stay relevant during the past three years have resulted in as a positive balance in the financial reports. We were able to deliver our first two-day professional development session to over 50 participants, providing information about Experiences Canada and the programs we offered. The session resulted in several applications being submitted for Exchanges in the 2023-2024 year. The additional application increases our total applications to 146 resulting in thousands of youths traveling, continuing the improvement from prior years.


The FinLit "Money 101" series is scheduled to be launched in November 2023. A series to provide basic money skills to the participants, filling a knowledge gap that was identified in the prior year.

The annual budget has increased from the prior years as more groups are expected to travel. The increase in revenues by \$3.27 million compared to prior year's revenue was offset by the increase in expenses by \$2.95 million. At the end of the year we were able to report a net positive position of \$36,000 which has not been done for the past 2 years.



The organization then known as Visites Interprovinciales was founded in 1936 when James Biggar, a history teacher from Upper Canada College created a summer exchange program for his students to live with

Quebec families to further their understanding of French Canada. Over the next 50 years the organization would expand its operations to include linguistic exchange opportunities for schools across Ontario.



Visites Interprovinciales gains notoriety when MacLean's Magazine

publishes an article about the exchange program interviewing prominent alumni families including Roland Michener, George Grant, and Kenneth Ramsay, and attributing the program to the Diefenbaker government's majority election win and breakthrough success in Quebec. A reported 1500 students from Ontario and Quebec participate in the program annually.

In 1986, SEVEC celebrated 50 years and twinned its 50,000th pair

of youth. More than 2,500 exchange students gathered in Ottawa to celebrate the exciting milestones

Visites Interprovinciales merges with the Bilingual Exchange Secretariat an Ottawa-based organization founded by prominent educator and politician Jane Dobell. Together they became known as the Society for Educational Visits and Exchanges in Canada, better recognized as SEVEC.



SEVEC continues to be best known for its linguistic exchanges now offered across Canada, but also begins to broadened its focus to support cross cultural exchanges throughout Canada, to increase youth understanding of history, heritage, and the rich cultural and geographic diversity of Canada.

In 2015, the Society for Educational Visits and Exchanges in Canada (SEVEC) changed its



name to Experiences Canada, a fully bilingual name that reflected its origins and core commitment to advancing opportunities for both French and English, but also reflected our continued desire to create connections for youth to our country, its diversity, its challenges and opportunities, and to each other.

Experiences Canada 150&Me a new youth leadership program is confirmed as a Canada 150 signature initiative. A series of regional forums for young people between the ages of 14 and 19, are held across Canada over a three-month period culminating in

Ottawa the week of Canada Day, 2017. More than 3,900 young Canadians in a national conversation about Canada's future. Which continues today through the annual Youth Leadership Forum program.

With the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, for the first time in its history, Experiences Canada had to cancel all planned travel and

exchanges. Within five weeks of the shutdown, Experiences Canada launched its first virtual program, Online Conversations Series on Reconciliation. This was the first in a series of online programs on topics such as allyship, career choices, and financial literacy, designed to provide educators with relevant, accessible resources on topics relevant to todays youth.

MEET OUR ALUMNI COGIE COGAN

any of the wonderful individuals I had the privilege of meeting at the Experiences Canada Forum on Diversity and Inclusion have remained close contacts, and together, we have collaborated on various community projects. The forum united a group of passionate young individuals from all corners of the country, all embarking on their journeys as champions of social change. Fastforward a few years, and many of us have transitioned into young adults, leading our own initiatives within the realm of diversity and inclusion. Some of us have even joined forces with fellow forum attendees to drive positive social change.

For instance, one of my friends, whom I met through Experiences Canada, partnered with me to establish our university's inaugural student club dedicated to nurturing environmentally conscious business leaders. The forum cultivated a network of social change advocates, each of whom, in the next 5, 10, or even 30 years, will undoubtedly

make a significant impact, bolstered by the support of 64 other like-minded individuals.

As a 16-year-old who had spent most of my life in a familiar community, the discussions during the forum prompted profound self-reflection on my privilege and my place in the world, something I had rarely contemplated before. It instigated my exploration of profound questions, such as my responsibilities to the communities I belong to and my obligations to those who have endured oppression. Additionally, it encouraged me to

scrutinize the ways in which I, as a young person, had been marginalized. Attending the forum empowered me to recognize and harness my voice as a Canadian youth.

The other youth participants in the forum were exceptional leaders, and after a week of hearing about their accomplishments in their respective communities, I felt inspired to initiate the change I aspired to see in my own community. Subsequently, I joined the Youth Advisory Council (YAC) and remained a part of it for two years, ultimately serving as Vice-President in my second year. During my tenure on the YAC, I had the opportunity to refine my public speaking and diplomacy skills through meetings with Members of Parliament.

Now, four years after attending the Forum on Diversity and Inclusion, I have been actively involved in advancing causes such as climate action and LGBTQ+ rights, among other critical challenges. I have also become an ally to numerous other communities because our world requires not only leaders but also fierce supporters of other people's work. I am thankful to have been involved with Experiences Canada as it has been instrumental in developing my critical awareness and leadership skills.














VIRTUAL FORUM 2023

response to the uncertainties arising from the COVID-19 pandemic in 2022, Experiences Canada had to adapt and transition our youth forums into a virtual format. From December 2022 to April 2023, the forums drew together youth from grades 7-12 from all corners of the country in a safe and engaging online environment.

At the heart of these forums was a strong emphasis on education and connection. The forums encompassed a wide range of subjects, ensuring that every participant found something that resonated with their interests and passions. The topics were thoughtfully selected to address critical issues facing Canadian society in the present and the future, and aligned with curricula from grades 7-12 in STEM, social studies, language, and creative studies, as well as second language learning.

Each topic was carefully explored by experts in the respective fields, offering invaluable insights and facilitating meaningful discussions among the participants. The discussions were aimed at empowering young minds to develop a more profound understanding of the challenges facing themselves and others, and in turn, inspire them to become proactive advocates for positive change.

Diversity & Inclusion encouraged young people to identify their passions and dreams, equipping them with the tools to create a fulfilling future. This section aimed to instill a sense of purpose and direction among the participants, encouraging them to pursue their goals with determination and resilience.

Our Reconciliation forum provided an opportunity for participants to engage in discussions about the country's historical injustices and the importance of healing and building meaningful relationships with Indigenous communities. By shedding light on this vital aspect of the nation's identity, young attendees were given the opportunity to become informed advocates for positive change and contribute to reconciliation efforts in their communities.







Beyond this, exchanges create connections within communities, inspiring participants to take active roles in their communities and sparking passions that could potentially shape their future careers and life trajectories.



Then we spent two days at a nearby boat-in community called Esperanza, across from Nootka Island. We spent time on the water in kayaks, paddle boards and war canoes! At this point in the trip, our groups were getting along very well, and we felt like one!

The master carver, Vince Smith, invited us to his workshop and shared some of his knowledge and the totem poles he was working on. Then, we saw a ton of marine life while whale watching in Telegraph Cove. The trip's highlight for many of our class was the last activity of the week - a boat tour of the Ehattesaht First Nation territories. Chief Simon and two other community members took our group in three boats on a day-long boat tour. We saw the sites of past villages and important cultural sites, went fishing and swimming, ate oysters and had a lot of fun seeing the beautiful scenery and open ocean.

By the end of the trip, it was hard saying goodbye to our new friends from Zeballos! We are so grateful to have had this experience and made these connections. Thank you for setting up our exchange and supporting us along the way. We will carry everything we have learned for the rest of our lives.



















SKI CLUB EXCHANGES






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
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FROM SIMCOE TO PAULATUK

rom September 25 to October 1, 2022, we had the privilege of hosting students and teachers from Angik School in Paulatuk, here in central Ontario. We had an exciting time showing them some of the many attractions in our area, but the REAL excitement for our students was the opportunity to travel to Paulatuk in April 2023.

Our adventure began with a flight from Toronto to Edmonton, where we overnighted. The next day, our travels continued with a flight from Edmonton to Yellowknife, and on to Inuvik, where we boarded our charter flight to Paulatuk.

We were greeted at the airport by the smiling faces of many of the exchange participants and were transported into the community. The -25°C temperatures were a bit of a wake-up for us!

Angik School and the community of Paulatuk, where the last student exchange was over 40 years ago,

welcomed us with great friendship, great food, and great activities. We spent two days on ice fishing trips to local lakes. Although the number of fish caught wasn't phenomenal, the experience of ice fishing through 6-foot deep ice certainly was. Community members, including the local RCMP officer, were most helpful in transporting us and all the required provisions with their snowmobiles









and qamutik. Some of our students were even outfitted with more appropriate winter wear for the trips when our "Ontario winter appropriate" clothing wasn't quite appropriate for Paulatuk conditions! It really does "take a village" to host an exchange.

Our students benefited from learning several traditional Inuvialuit crafts from Elders in the Paulatuk community. Everyone had the opportunity to make a tapestry, and several of the students also tried their hand at beading. The finished products were beautiful!

Experiencing traditional food items was another highlight for our central Ontario students. We feasted on caribou, Arctic char, and trout, and were able to sample beluga muktuk. On days when non-traditional foods weren't on the menu, we were certainly well fed with other more familiar foods. In addition to the traditional foods, we participated in several traditional games, both inside and outside the school. We also listened to, and participated in, a presentation by the world-renowned Paulatuk Moonlight Singers and Dancers, who shared their traditional dances

and drumming skills with us.

Students had the opportunity to ski or snowshoe to the wreck of the ship The Roger in the bay just outside Paulatuk. This ship was one that was used to transport children from Paulatuk to residential schools in Aklavik and Inuvik, and its visible presence is a reminder of the need for healing and reconciliation between settlers and

Inuit peoples.

Two of the Paulatuk Elders, both of whom were taken to residential schools at the age of five, shared their stories with us. One of the Elders told us that he didn't return home (even for holidays) until he was 10 years old. By then, he had almost forgotten who his parents and family were. The most touching moment of the entire exchange (for me) was when this man said that he and several other residential school survivors had contacted the nun who had been their supervisor in the school residence. They talked and shared their stories, and at the end, they told the nun that they forgave her. To me, that showed great courage and great generosity of character. I'm not sure that I would have been able to do the same thing.

Tuktut Nogait National Park is located several kilometers from Paulatuk, but the Park Office is in the hamlet. Students had a chance to learn about the park, and about its importance in the preservation of the Blue Nose Caribou herd.

recent memory. Following the dance, we headed to the hills outside of town for a bonfire and some time together. Before we knew it, it was midnight, and the sun still hadn't set! Not something we're used to in central Ontario.

A very special thanks goes to Beaufort-Delta Divisional Education Council teachers Chris MacLea, who helped with the process of planning the exchange last school year, before he moved to Tsiigehtchic; and to Kyle Sagert and Julie Clark, who completed the planning and oversaw the great experience for all our students.





